## Learning English through Pop Music


When Lord Byron was sent a recently invented kaleidoscope by his publisher in 1819, he noted its "constantly changing colours". This was the first of many poetic references to the multi-coloured properties of the optical toy. The word kaleidoscope conjures an ever-changing extravagant image and is a joy to pronounce, with its four distinct vowel sounds and consonants positioning your lips and tongue into four different shapes.

Pop music has long embraced this word as a metaphor for variety in colours, emotions, passions and even cultures. Elton John refers to the "twisting kaleidoscope" of the passage of time on his Oscar winning "Can You Feel The Love Tonight", and Taylor Swift uses the toy as a metaphor for New York City on her album 1989. A search of lyric videos on www.tuneintoenglish.com

gives seventeen songs with the word in the title. Coldplay use it in a message to embrace human experience over a lifetime, with a reading of an extract of "The Guest House" by 13th-century Persian poet Rumi and a clip of US President Barack Obama singing "Amazing Grace".

The word is used perhaps most famously in The Beatles' "Lucy In The Sky With Diamonds", with John Lennon singing about "the girl with kaleidoscope eyes". Although Lennon meant it as a psychedelic reference to a colourful physical characteristic, one wonders if he was aware of its kaleidoscopic meaning: Kaleidoscope Vision, often called "kaleidoscope eyes", is a medical term for distorted vision, usually temporary and often caused by migraines.
