The Rolling Stones' (I Can't Get No) Satisfaction

Frutto della confusione onirica di Richards e dell'immaginario poetico ricco di doppi sensi e allusioni sessuali di Jagger, questo grande successo della band britannica è una critica deliberatamente ambigua alla cultura statunitense.

he distinctive guitar riff of what is arguably The Rolling Stones' signature song², (I Can't Get No) Satisfaction, was written by the British band's guitarist Keith Richards in his sleep. He woke during the night with the idea in his head, quickly recording it on a portable cassette player. When he played it back the next day, he heard a further forty minutes of snoring4! He played the riff for singer Mick Jagger who fleshed it out 5 in just ten minutes with lyrics that, as he later told Rolling Stone magazine, expressed his frustration with "America, its advertising syndrome, the constant barrage⁶."

The band recorded the track while on tour in America, but in a folk style that Richards was unhappy with. Two days later they cut⁷ a rock version in a style that became synonymous with the Rolling Stones' music. Richards wanted to use a horn section⁸ for the riff, but instead settled for a fuzz 10 guitar effect, pioneering a new sound. The title and hook 11 of the song is grammatically incorrect; the double negative would mean the line literally meant 'I can get satisfaction'. However, the double negative used to reiterate a negative is

often used in English slang 12. Lyrically the

verses are mostly in the present continuous, giving a sense of the singer's irritation. The line "tryin' to make some girl" caused

controversy, although a far more problematic reference is actually "on a losing streak¹³" (1960s slang for menstruation). The song was released in the US in June 1965 and ten weeks later in Britain when the band returned home. It became the band's first US number one (and fourth number one in the UK), propelling them to superstardom14.

In the same interview with Rolling Stone magazine released in 1995, Jagger acknowledged that this song "made the Rolling Stones 15" with its catchy 16 title, catchy riff and great sound. As the veteran rock star stated, it "captures a spirit of the times... alienation." 🛇
